look at the characteristics of each strength, and to use the book for future reference.

A HOLY WEEK REFLECTION

As I reflect on the burning of Notre Dame Cathedral, I am struck by many things. The timing. The damage. The lack of damage. The response to rebuild.

We are in Easter week, this time in the Christian calendar that we mourn death and look towards resurrection, the death of the Cathedral as we have known it seems especially symbolic. This is a death, but we look towards the rebirth of a restored Cathedral.

I have been feeling that there is a bigger message for us to derive. Not just for Christians, although maybe in particular for those that claim the

title, but for humankind in general. Regardless of where you land on the globe, there is great strife. Strife of our own making. We are feeling it here in the US through the divisive politics of hate. When we have our government dividing families who seek safety and a better life. When we have our president equating a member of congress with the attacks of 9/11. When we debate whether or not children deserve to be fed, housed, or given health care because of decisions and circumstances beyond their control. England is struggling with dividing themselves from the European Union. France is struggling with issues around refugees and those darn Americans and British folks as well as their own internal issues. Korea has been divided for years. Israel and Palestine are divided over religion and geographical claims. The mid-east is divided over theological interpretation. Everywhere is divided between the haves and have nots.

We have, as citizens of this planet, lost our ability to see beyond ourselves. We only care about enriching ourselves, be damned The Other. *I* am right and *you* are wrong. We seek to build walls (figuratively in most places, literally in a few) rather than bigger tables.

Christ did NOT give his life for us to behave like this.

This great symbol of Christianity has burned. The good news it that has also survived. God's love for us and the sacrifice that Christ made for us, survives through all manner of separation. When we have separated ourselves from one another, from our Earth, from God, and from Christ, we are still beloved children of God.

Already people across nations have pledged money to rebuild Notre Dame. As of this writing, a billion dollars has been pledged to rebuild.

(happily, the three black churches in Louisiana have also seen a surge in donations after the Notre Dame fire!) It is those with great wealth who have led the effort and done so with very large donations. Many of those are French, naturally, but the wealthy in the United States and United States companies (Apple, Disney) have also stepped forward with pledges.

Perhaps that is the message that we need this Holy Week. It's right there in the Bible. In Leviticus and Deuteronomy we are told to leave some of our wealth for the poor to glean and to lay aside for the orphans and widows. In Matthew we are told by Christ, "whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." In Mark, he tells us to "render unto Caesar what is Caesar's." Psalm 72 can argue that a righteous government assists the poor. Christ, in Luke 6:36-42 even manages to appeal to our modern sensibilities with ""Be merciful, even as your Father is (continued on page 6)

(continued from page 5) merciful. Judge not, and you will not be judged; condemn not, and you will not be condemned; forgive, and you will be forgiven; give, and it will be given to you. Good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap. For with the measure you use it will be measured back to you." Those with great wealth have a duty....a Christian duty.... to give. There is an obligation to make sure those without are cared for. We do this both through our gifts to the church, and through our taxes. For it is through taxes that roads are built and schools are funded; the hungry are fed; our seniors can live out their years safe, clothed, fed, housed. It is with our taxes that we could make sure all are able to maintain their health and not face fiscal ruin if illness or accident happens along. We as Christians ought to be the first to give our taxes and the last to complain. Christians ought to be a the forefront for social programs and the funding through taxes to create safety nets. Safety nets that could be there for any one of us. It is biblical to require more from those who have more.

We are a damaged people. We have lost our way. Like the Cathedral, our outward appearance is charred and ugly. Also, like the Cathedral, are not destroyed. Our foundation holds. Our own flying buttresses still hold us firm. We too can be resurrected. We too can be brought back from the ashes. We too can be washed clean. We just need to get our priorities in line with what Christ commanded us to do: Love one another. We need to clean up the ashes. Wipe away the water damage. Find our way to rebuild and bring ourselves, like we will the Cathedral, back to the Glory to God that we are called to do.

"So great to be able to reconnect with my sister and brother clergy spouses - being with people who understand...." said one. "So awesome to be with my own kind!" laughed another.


