REPORT ON RETIRED MINISTERS' FIRST BOOK STUDY <u>CASTE</u> BY ISABEL WILKERSON

Review of the book by **Linda Holbrook**, **[San Jose, CA**] our discussion leader:

Caste: The Origins of Our Discontent by Isabelle Wilkerson is a profound and disturbing book. Wilkerson begins by saying she is talking about the three best known caste systems; India, Nazi Germany, and the United States. I was surprised to see the United States in the list of caste systems. Wilkerson claims that caste is a better description of the United States than saying that the US is racist. She also claims that the caste system is deeply embedded in our culture and influences decisions made in every part of our culture, and in our daily lives. Further, Wilkerson notes that to change a caste system requires extensive work.

Many people refer to the period of slavery in this country as a sad, dark chapter of our history. Wilkerson reminds us that this chapter lasted hundreds of years and many of the inequities from the period of slavery continue today. In a caste system there is a dominate caste and a lower caste. In this country from the days of slavery, the white culture is considered the dominant caste, and people of color are considered the lower caste. The caste system requires the individuals in the caste system to fulfill the roles they are assigned. Those in the dominant caste have rules allowing for superiority over the lower caste. Those in the lower caste are expected to defer to those in the dominant caste. We can see examples of these rules in the culture today.



There are so many things I learned from this book. I will include just a few here that show the disparity between the dominant caste and the lower caste. A Virginia law in the 1600s stated that a child inherited the status of his or her mother. That meant a white slave owner who had children with a slave gained additional property. Years late after the Civil War, reparations were paid to the slave owners who lost property, and no reparations were paid to the former slaves. More recently, the GI bill for education and first time home ownership enacted after World War II did not apply to African Americans who had served in the war, only white soldiers.

One of the most disturbing things Wilkerson mentioned was that when the Nazis started determining how to establish laws to discriminate against the Jewish people, they used the laws from the southern states in the United States as models. I think we are all repulsed by Nazi Germany and the actions they took. We don't usually have the same reaction to the events in the United States and the laws regarding the lower caste. Perhaps it is easier to see the horrors of Nazi Germany than our own culture.

In addition to the well-founded research Wilkerson has shares personal stories; both her own personal stories and the stories of others.

I recount one story from the book. An African American father is at dinner in a restaurant with his son and telling him to eat his food. A white woman (a stranger) comes to the table and contradicts the father. The white woman is entitled to interfere because she is in the dominate caste, and the father is left in a quandary on whether to confront the woman or not.

Caste: The Origins of our Discontent encourages the reader to examine how the embedded rules of the caste system influence our thoughts and decisions. I grew up in the

South and I remembered hearing many of the justifications of why African Americans expected to be treated a certain way. I did a lot of reflection on the things I learned as a child, and what beliefs I hold today. Whether you grew up in the south or not, this book will help you understand the history of our country from a different perspective. I recommend this book to everyone.

Comments by several members:

Marty Murdock [Santa Rosa, CA]:

The best thing about our weekly book study discussion on the book Caste, was that we actually did it. Linda was gracious and well prepared as she nudged a group of talkative preachers along, as we reflected not only on the reading, but parallel sources, and our own experiences.

I found the book enlightening, sobering, and haunting. The specific examples from the past 300 years had great impact and made the case clearly for the ideas of caste advanced in the book.

I had always thought that caste was something in India, and it is. Maybe also South Africa and other

current and former colonies. But I saw clearly that it was true in Nazi Germany, and it was horrifying to realize that the Nazis studied the American system to learn how to minimize and ultimately destroy the Jewish population, after they were turned into the lowest caste.

It rings true and explains a lot, to realize that we in the US actually live within a caste system. Wilkersons description of the 8 "Pillars of Caste," as she describes them, are clearly the mechanisms which keep the

case system in place, in the US, or anyplace.

We have so much work to do, to fulfill the dream of a nation where we recognize all people as created equally and having equal rights. I feel more prepared for the continuing work now, after having digested this seminal presentation.

Again, thanks to all for sharing the time and the wrestling with the concepts and difficult realities.

I found Wilkerson's book to be of most value in that she brought together ideas I'd read elsewhere. If one takes a look at her footnotes and bibliography, one can see reasons for my conclusion. It's good to have a variety of resources brought together into ONE source."

I also think she pulls us away from two of our common errors: (1) she pulls us away from our tendency to see racism as, primarily an individualist and southern problem or, (2) worse yet, simply a moralizing problem. Wilkerson re-defines the issue as one of caste and, therefore, a problem that must be approached systemically (not individualistically) and with a multi-disciplinary comprehension.

Bud Tillinghast Oxfordshire UK:

Wilkerson's book confirmed my experiences from when I was the executive for the Oakland Metro Ministries back in the 1980s. The Metro consisted of our 14 UMC congregations totaling 4000 members, half of which were Black.

The pastors of Taylor Memorial UMC and Downs Memorial UMC, for instance, reflected the central point of **Caste.** Though attitudes of racism were important to change in individual church members, even more important was the need to change the social, political, and economic system. From the publisher: "The hierarchy of caste is not about feelings or morality. It is about power—which groups have it and which do not."

To feel good toward people of color is nice; but what is really desired is to share the power that naturally and automatically falls on those of us in our society who are White On the human level, it is hard to give up the perks of White privilege. But that is what the Gospel calls us to do.
